

Michael Murphy, a book publishing professional, has been a vice president at Random House, publisher of William Morrow, and founder of the literary agency Max & Co. By day two of his first visit to New Orleans in 1983, he knew he was home. He finally moved to New Orleans in 2009, and will never leave. Murphy is the author of A Eat Dat, Hear Dat, A and Â Fear Dat.

Having moved away from New Orleans a few years back, I bought this book because I was feeling a bit homesick and it delivered exactly what I had hoped it would: the feeling of being home once more. Fear Dat is essentially a guidebook to the city, specifically the dark, gritty, and paranormal side, but it at its heart it is so much more than that. Mr. Murphy captures not only the weird and the supernatural, but also the spirit and the wonder of the city and its people. Filled with stories and facts, Murphy also seasons the book with charming anecdotes just as though you were having a conversation with a New Orleanian. Beautifully written, every story, every page, every little aside will make you gasp or laugh, sometimes both at once, while also transporting you to a place the author clearly loves and will make you fall in love with as well. You will get all the information you need about where to eat, stay, and shop in New Orleans, but you will also get all of its endearing charm. In a city that is filled with stories and storytellers, New Orleans is lucky to add Mr. Murphy to her repertoire.
