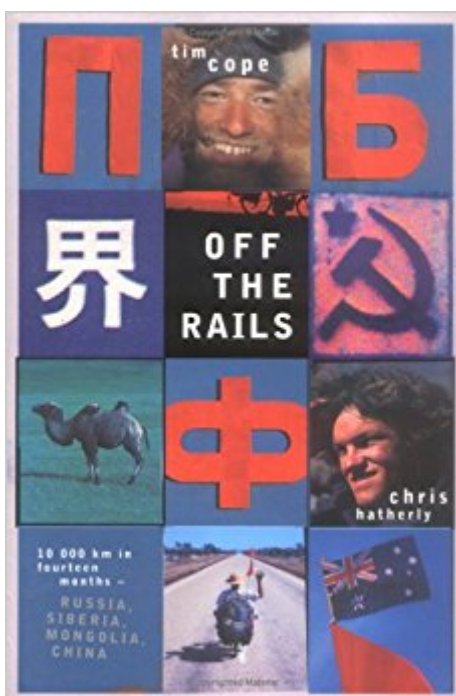

This is a great read documenting the highs and lows of a friendship as it is stretched across 10,000km of rough road. I initially found this book after watching a documentary featuring one of the authors, Tim, as he journeyed across the central Asian steppe on a horse. He referred to the journey documented in this book in the introduction so I decided to check it out. I'm really glad I did! The diverse adventures they experience both on and off the bike kept me turning the pages well past when I should have gone to bed. The chapter by chapter author switching was also well done, striking a good balance between their two, often differing, viewpoints about the trip.

If you're into cycle touring, as I am, or just love a real life adventure story, this is the book for you. These two guys set out to cross Russia in the dead of winter and did it. Unbelievable hardships,
