He is the author of *Backcountry Skiing Adventures Vermont and New York* and *Backcountry Skiing Adventures: Classic Ski and Snowboard Tours in Maine and New Hampshire*.

This is an excellent back country guide. It's great to know approximately what you're getting into before you hike into the backcountry, and drop into a stash with little knowledge of where it may

lead. I've had a few experiences where I had to hike many miles to get back to a road. The book is very detailed, and has an excellent assortment of trails in New England, and the Adirondacks. I've only have experience with the northern Vermont trails, but I'm sure the others are just as good.

Descriptive in every aspect. . .directions to each tour, ascent, and descent. Everything from cross-country ski tours, to mountaineering back-country ski tours, easy to extreme. Also includes a history of each tour! Awesome guide.

Some great writeups in here. A lot of history is given for each tour and the directions are very clear and include maps, parking directions, etc. I wasn't expecting as many pure "tours" where the downhill aspect is secondary to the tour, but there are a good number like that. Not a bad thing, just not exactly what I was expecting. There are still plenty of tours included with some great downhill.
