


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# **ODY-C, Vol. 1: Off To Far Ithica**

Odyssia and her crew of women are on a ten-year voyage home following a century-long galactic war. In this first volume, the journey begins, they go to the lotus gardens, and they meet the cyclops. While the influences of Homer are strong, the book has its own voice. Ward's illustrations pleasantly remind me of Moebius's, and although this is a difficult book to get into, it's a hard one to put down. I read it over 30 or 40 minutes. The illustrations are definitely more engaging than the writing is, the latter being a bit too dense at times, although I did appreciate the textural line numbers. It gave the title the feel of an epic poem which might be lost on some readers. I had a hard time ranking this book, and I ended up vacillating between \*\*\*3/4 and \*\*\*\*\*. I decided on the latter, giving the collection \*\*\*\*\*, which probably means I'll buy the next collection.

I love this complicated, mind-bending book. It's been ages since I picked up something so challenging and dense, and enjoy each page. The writing is lyrical and poetic, as befits a re-imagining of Homer's work, and the art is beyond anything I've ever seen. This should be required reading for sci-fi and classics lovers, regardless of whether you've liked Fraction's past work or enjoy comic books. This is truly something else that you have to see to believe.

An ambitious project well executed. At times it's a tad dense, especially at the beginning, but I think I had that reaction partially because I have read of Matt Fraction's work that I was expecting his typical style, and this is different. That said, once you get into the rhythm of the book it is SO GOOD. An interesting retelling of the Odyssey, and then there's Christian Ward's art which is MIND BLOWING. I actually met him (and Matt) at a convention and he is so low-key about his work, but this is one of the most incredible visual experiences I've had in comics. Matt Fraction actually says the same thing about it, which tells you something. Definitely recommended.

Having never read Homer's Odyssey, I was a bit skeptical about going into this interpretation. Boy-howdy, am I glad I did. Christians Ward's art really paints the setting that Matt Frampton story is taking place in. It's not an easy read by any means, but I would recommend this to people familiar with Homer's work and people that may want to eventually read Homer's work.

ODY-C is a great example of how comics are continuing to develop as a medium. A masterful partnership between Ward and Fraction creates a vibrant re-telling of the Odyssey with a very complex re-understanding of gender. The images blow you away and the words make you think. Not for the beginning comics reader, especially one expecting a "typical" comic book, but that is also what makes it great.

Matt Fraction has always been a hit or miss writer to me, but Ody-C falls somewhere in the middle. There are enough updates to the classic tale to keep fans of the story happy, but many recognizable themes and plot turns that keep it on track. I enjoy audacious and bizarre comics but the execution of this volume fell on its face sprinting. The artwork is beautiful but, as others have noted, too chaotic to discern what's happening in many panels. Some may find this artistic, and in a non-narrative medium I wouldn't mind, but here it was annoying and tiring. Seriously, though, almost every page spread in this volume deserves a run of prints!I will say that the combination of twisted art, alien character motivations, and the phrasing of the writing felt like a knock-off of the vastly superior Prophet reboot from Brandon Graham. Go buy all the trades of Prophet instead and borrow this from a friend.

This is an incredible retelling of the Odyssey. The illustrations are beyond spectacular and lend another dimension to the story itself. It is worth rereading many times just to appreciate the interaction of the story and the visual experience. I will definitely buy the next volume.

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
