

The first two editions of this book focused on affordable living in Hawaii. This new expanded Third Edition does it again, with new info on surviving the recent housing price increases. In addition, now revealed is an aspect of living in Hawaii that is so important that it may seriously effect the lives of all who callthe Aloha State their home.

This book is well written and has a lot of good information to consider prior to making a move to the big island of Hawaii from a person who has already made the move. What he shares is important, basic information that I find interesting and would not have considered. It doesn't matter that it wasn't written this year - the information about the culture is timeless.

Of all the books I have read about Hawaii, this was my favorite. As a retiree contemplating a move to the Big Island, I found this book to be spot on. Only someone who has lived on the island for many years could have written this. I especially found the descriptions of the neighborhoods helpful

and for me, a time saver. Thomsen spends a lot of time on the emotional and social aspects of the lifestyle change that is part of a move to Hawaii and that I believe to be very important. Just a side note: according to the author's web site, the couple has returned to the mainland "to be closer to their grandchildren".

Nearing retirement, we have been considering different places that we might like to live. After visiting different Hawaiian islands over the years, there is much that appeals to us. Assuming that it would be expensive to live in Hawaii, the title, Affordable Paradise caught my attention. This book does a great job of summarizing the important things to be aware before considering a move to the Big Island of Hawaii from the various districts, to what to move, to health care. Chapter 10, Final Thoughts, starts "...whether you're more sure than ever that Hawai'i will be your new home, or if we've helped you discover that you now would like to check out Mexico, it doesn't matter. What is important is that we've helped you become clear on your intentions." And I think that goal was reached.

The book is confined to the Big Island and the material is dated, but it is helpful in determining whether or not you will fit into the Aloha spirit--by this I mean your psychological ability to live in the Islands. The authors truly understand the laid-back lifestyle. If you are too impatient to "talk story" with a neighbor or get irked when the contractor shows up late--even a day or so later--because of "really gnarly surf" that called for a board on the water but not a board on your house; well, don't even consider Hawaii. You have to adapt and love a new lifestyle. Not everyone can or does and those people end up going back to the mainland. The Big Island is well-surveyed as far as the different areas in which to retire--some expensive, some less so, and others not really suited as there are perpetually barking dogs--many of the old time families do not consider them a nuisance--along with free range chickens, crowing roosters, and agreements with the local officials to ignore minor crimes in some locales. If you want a survey of resorts, nightlife, or the excitement of Honolulu, this book will not be helpful. Although I did see myself possibly at a Starbucks on the Kona coast, that is not the norm. If you like a smaller town and more rural atmosphere that is surprising affordable--take a look.
