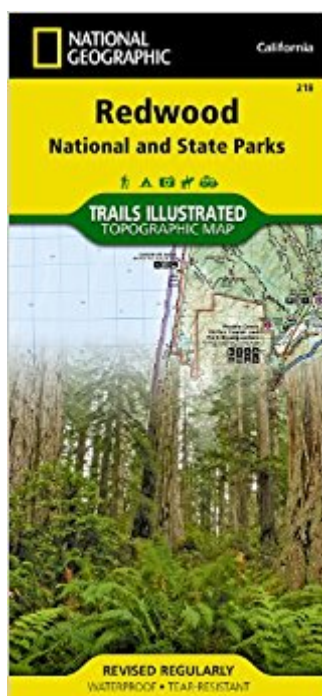

Redwood National And State Parks (National Geographic Trails Illustrated Map)

Expertly researched and created in partnership with the National Park Service, California States Parks, U.S. Forest Service and others, the map has bountiful information and safety tips that are essential when exploring the area. Some of the key points of interest included are Six Rivers National Forest, Smith River National Recreation Area, North Fork Smith River Botanical Area, Siskiyou Wilderness, Humboldt Lagoons State Park and Yurok Indian Reservation. The map will guide you to trailheads and then along clearly marked trails with mileage indicators between intersections, colored according to their designated usage. There is a table of featured hikes, including trail name, distance, difficulty and trail description. Additionally, the map base includes contour lines and elevations for peaks and summits. For those preferring an aquatic adventure, mileage markers are also included along the Klamath Wild and Scenic River. The Redwood Highway Scenic Byway is marked for those wishing to explore the area by car. Many recreation activities are available in the area and marked on the map, including motorized and non-motorized boat launches; river and beach access points; swimming and windsurfing areas; campgrounds, primitive campsites and cabins; and lookout towers and wildlife viewing areas. Every Trails Illustrated map is printed on "Backcountry Tough" waterproof, tear-resistant paper. A full UTM grid is printed on the map to aid with GPS navigation. Other features found on this map include: Big Lagoon, Klamath National Forest, Klamath River, Lake Earl, Maple Creek, Pelican Bay, Point Saint George, Redwood, Rocky Point, Saint George Reef, Siskiyou Mountains, Siskiyou National Forest, Siskiyou Wilderness, Six Rivers National Forest, Smith River, Trinidad Head. Founded in 1915 as the Cartographic Group, the first division of National Geographic, National Geographic Maps has been responsible for illustrating the world around us through the art and science of mapmaking. Today, National Geographic Maps continues this mission by creating the world's best wall maps, recreation maps, atlases, and globes which inspire people to care about and explore their world.

The map is great in its detail and its durability, but it's not really any better than the free one they'll give you at the park entrance. When I went to Bryce Canyon and Zion National Parks last year, I bought the National Geographic maps ahead of time and they helped me plan out the hikes to do at each. Both of those maps had pretty good descriptions for most of the hiking trails (length, height, level of difficulty, condition/type of trail, what to expect to see, time you should expect to take.) We were able to plan ahead which trails to take, which 2 could be done in the same day, and in what order to do them in. It was great. So, when we were planning our next hiking trip (that included going to Redwood, Mount Rainier, Olympic, Crater Lake, and Mount St. Helen), we immediately ordered this map to help us plan. This time around we had to not only figure out what trails to do in each park but compare the trails of all the parks to help us figure out how to split 2 weeks between 5 parks. We thought that all the maps would have the same info for the hiking trails as Zion & Bryce Canyon had. They don't. This map was useless for the purpose we wanted it. Instead of getting the info from a single reliable source, we had to trust to the internet. This didn't help much. Though there are a lot of postings about the trails, they're all very opinionated instead of factual. They described how beautiful the trail was, but would leave off the trail's length, height, level of difficulty, condition/type of trail, what to expect to see, or time it should take. So if you're looking for hiking info, don't get this map. Just wait until you get there and go right to the info station and talk with a park ranger. It doesn't help planning ahead of time, but it's a lot better than taking the internet's advice.

This map is a great map showing the Redwood National Parks, State Parks, and nearby areas. If you are visiting the area and driving between the parks, this is a great tool. The detail on the hiking

trails is more than sufficient, but the hiking maps offered by "Redwood Hikes Press" offer superior detail for the hiking trails.

This map is awesome!!! It is waterproof to start, which makes it innately more difficult to tear than a normal paper map. We took this map when my boyfriend and I traveled to the Redwoods and it was incredibly helpful, and fun to look at! We have it hanging on our wall currently & I highly recommend it even if you aren't travelling immediately.
