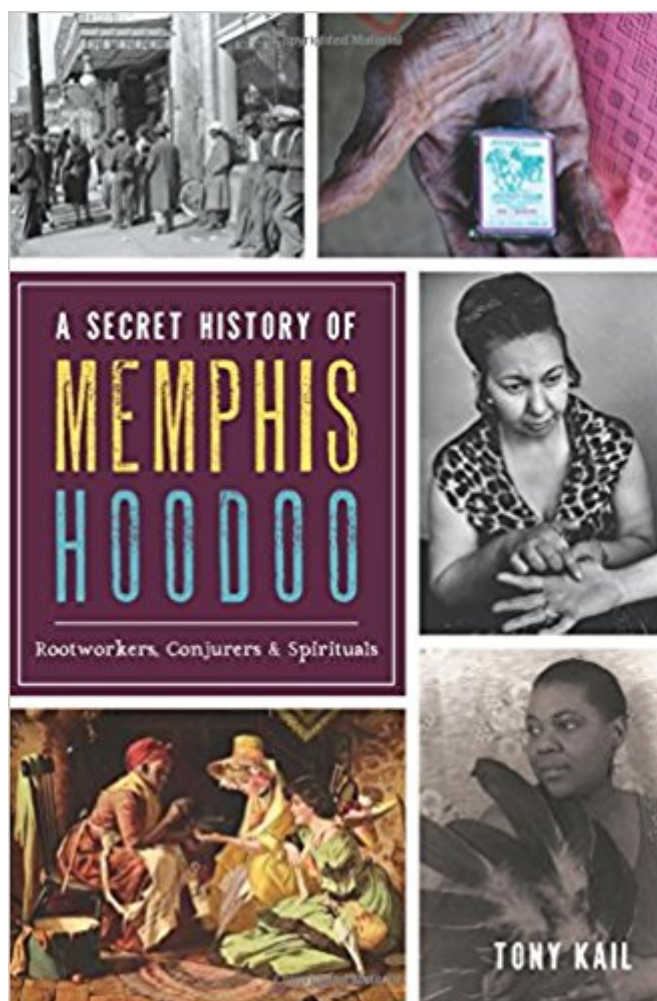

Widely known for its musical influence, Beale Street was also once a hub for Hoodoo culture. Many blues icons, such as Big Memphis Ma Rainey and Sonny Boy Williamson, dabbled in the mysterious tradition. Its popularity in some African American communities throughout the past two centuries fueled racial tension--practitioners faced social stigma and blame for anything from natural disasters to violent crimes. However, necessity sometimes outweighed prejudice, and even those with the highest social status turned to Hoodoo for prosperity, love or retribution. Author Tony Kail traces this colorful Memphis heritage, from the arrival of Africans in Shelby County to the growth of conjure culture in juke joints and Spiritual Churches.

Tony Kail is an ethnographer and writer. He holds a degree in cultural anthropology and has researched magico-religious cultures for more than twenty-five years. His work has taken him from Voodoo ceremonies in New Orleans to Haitian Botanicas in Harlem and Spiritual Churches in East Africa. He has lectured at more than one hundred universities, hospitals and public safety agencies. Kail has been featured on CNN Online, the History Channel and numerous radio, television and print outlets. A resident of Humboldt, Tennessee, Kail was raised in Memphis and calls it his second home.

Hoodoo is a American folk-magic tradition that travelled from Africa to the new world with those Americans who entered as victims of chattel slavery. Hoodoo, Conjure and Root-work as it is commonly known, quickly became powerful force in the lives of both whites and African Americans while remaining a secret, often hidden-in-plain sight practice that co-existed alongside Christianity and church life. Each area of the country had its own flavor of Hoodoo and the Memphis region was no exception. Mr. Kail an anthropologist and author, has thoroughly researched the Memphis tradition and added many scholarly elements from notable in this often over-looked aspect of spiritual/religious life in America. His writing style is engaging and enchanting and I suspect that once you pick up "A secret history...you will not be able to put it down. I cannot praise this title

enough as it adds much to the subject and the research of this great American spiritual tradition. The characters and practices are fascinating and best of all, they are real and you are learning about a magical practice that is still very much alive today.
