


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The Rough Guide Brittany & Normandy 8 (Rough Guide Travel Guides)

Greg Ward has been a regular visitor to Brittany and Normandy for the last 20 years. In that time, he has also written Rough Guides to Southwest USA, Las Vegas, Hawaii and Honolulu.

I bought this book in anticipation of visiting Normandy. On first glance, it looked ideal for my purposes (traveling alone with lots of time to meander). Once into the book, I saw that few of the towns have maps--even maps of cities'-centers would be helpful. More than that, though, was the condescending tone he used when discussing holy places (i.e., referring to the devotion to Saint Th $\tilde{A}f\hat{A}$ "r $\tilde{A}f\hat{A}$ ©se of Lisieux as "a cult"). The author's inflated sense of self was reflected in nearly every section of this book, and I soon relegated it to the bottom of my suitcase: I wanted

information; not editorializing. For the rest of my trip, I did quite well with small town maps (free at any tourism office).

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
