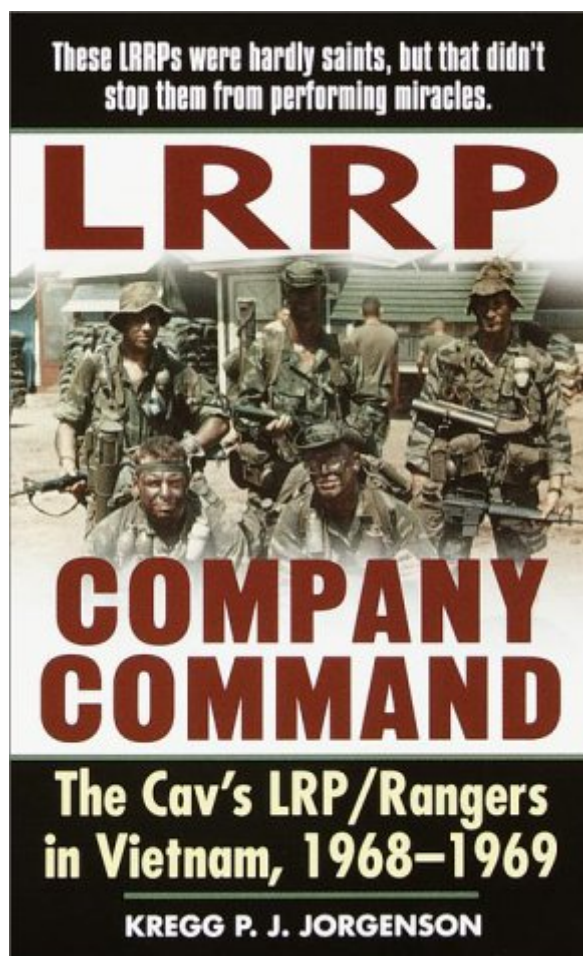

LRRP Company Command: The Cav's LRP/Rangers In Vietnam, 1968-1969



Synopsis

A gripping account of ordinary men with extraordinary courage and heroism who had one last chance to make good "and one helluva war zone to do it in. " The new commander of the Company E, 52d Infantry LRRPs, Capt. George Paccereili, was tough, but the men's new AO was brutal. It was bad enough that the provinces of Binh Long, Phuoc Long, and Tay Ninh bordered enemy-friendly Cambodia, but their vast stretches of double- and triple-canopy jungle were also home to four crack enemy divisions, including the Viet Cong's notorious 95C Regiment. Only the long-range patrols could deliver the critical strategic intelligence that the 1st Cav so desperately needed. Outmanned, outgunned, far from safety, these LRRPs stalked the enemy to his lair, staging bold prisoner snatches and tracking down hidden jungle bases. Hiding in ambush, surrounded by NVA, these teams either pulled off spectacular escape-and-evasion maneuvers in running firefights "or died trying.

Compared to other books about LRRP's; which I've found to be mostly accounts of troops in contact and non stop action, this had a lot of detail about life as a LRRP commanding officer. I gave it 3 stars because I was expecting more about patrols in "deep kimchi" with the enemy.

The book was much less about long range patrol experiences, and much much more about how great Capt George Paccereilli was. Paccereilli's name is mentioned, on the average, 3 times on each page of this publication. Yes, other people were referred to, but mostly in regard to those Capt Paccereilli was issuing advice or orders to. I bought the book as a way to learn what variety of situations long range patrols got in & out of during their assignment in Vietnam. What I got was a biography of Paccereilli's Vietnam experience, including his words, phrases & thoughts on various related aspects of LRRP.

Organizational processes first part of book followed by the actual LRRP operations which I enjoyed more of course! The bravery and skill of these amazing troops inserted into Indian country on their own is exciting reading!

In the process of reading it now and it appears to be a very good read. I will know more as I continue on but at present it is holding my attention and that is all I ask for in a good read.
